



ONE HUNDRED YEARS -KEEPING THE CELEBRATION GOING

During the recent Century for a Century fundraiser, badges for accomplishments were awarded honoring six suffragists. We wanted to know more about each of them and will be highlighting one of these remarkable women with you each month.

MARY MC CLOUD BETHUNE (1881-1965)

"Faith is the first factor in a life dedicated to service. Without it nothing is possible, with it nothing is impossible."

This philosophy served Mary McCloud Bethune well. Who would have imagined that a five year old child of former slaves picking cotton in South Carolina would one day become an advisor to a U.S. president. Sometimes called "the Female Booker T. Washington", Mary was an educator, organizer, and political activist. She helped make significant advances for African Americans, especially women and children locally, nationally and internationally.

Below are just some of her many accomplishments:

- **Locally** As a resident of Daytona, FL, Mary founded a private school for African American students which later became Bethune-Cookman University where she served as president.
- **Statewide**-As president of the Florida chapter of the National Association of Colored Women she focused on registering African Americans voters despite threats from the KKK.

- **Nationally** Mary was co-founder of the United Negro College Fund. She is well known for serving as a special advisor to Franklin Delano Roosevelt on problems related to minority groups.
- **Internationally** Mary was a member of the delegation that drafted the charter for the United Nations. Mary McCloud Bethune was honored by the state of Florida in 2018. The legislature designated her as a subject for Florida in the National Statuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol, interestingly replacing that of a confederate general.

APRIL FOCUS: SUSTAINABILITY TEAM


The Tampa Bay region is, well, all about Tampa Bay - in more ways than many of us realize. Tampa Bay and the surrounding watershed and habitat provide the environment and natural beauty, including the coastlines, that our area is known for. Focusing on protecting and restoring Tampa Bay, says Laura Crabtree, head of the Sustainability Action Team and longtime marine biologist, helps the group find a focus within the broad topic of sustainability and ties into so many other issues, including sea level rise, water quality, and wildlife protection.

The Sustainability Action Team collaborates with Tampa Bay Watch, Tampa Bay Estuary Program, Surfrider Foundation, Keep Pinellas Beautiful, and other environmental organizations on projects to support the Tampa Bay Estuary, such as community cleanups, which provide a nice opportunity to get outside and volunteer in the midst of COVID-19. However, Laura emphasizes that while we can clean as much as humanly possible, environmental protection comes down to policies and decisions made at the city, county, and state level.

So much of what the League of Women Voters is about, says Laura, is being knowledgeable civic participants. That's where Laura and the Action Team really come in - researching the issues, providing education and information on how proposed policies will impact the environment, and sharing guidance on how to effectively and knowledgeably take action to advocate for the environment.

Conservatives for NPV

Floridians for National Popular Vote has added a new coalition member: Conservatives for NPV. The National Popular Vote preserves the Electoral College, must be enacted by state legislators, and does not require approval by the US Congress. As a non-partisan issue, we are delighted to have a conservative organization join our other coalition members, LWV Florida, Common Cause Florida and Making Every Vote Matter.

NPV Op-Eds and Education Campaign

Floridians for National Popular Vote has had success getting 22 Op-Eds published in newspapers around the state followed by numerous Letters-to-the-editor published.

Another campaign under way is a weekly educational series to all Legislators and their staff via email (Mail Chimp). The goal is to provide tidbits of quality information to dispel the negative concepts that a lot of people have about NPV.

Thumbs Up, Way Up!

The "Cream of the Crop" recognition goes to those volunteers who performed exceptional volunteer efforts during the month. Pat and Cynthia are members of the National Popular Vote (NPV) Interstate Compact team lead by Deb Mazzaferro and Marty Shapiro.

As volunteers for the Op-Eds and Letters to Editor efforts from December 2020 – March 2021, Pat and Cynthia joined their combined communications expertise to reach out to Editorial Boards across Florida securing agreements from 22 local newspapers to run OP-EDs on promoting the NPV. Using other volunteers across the state, they guided local constituents in writing the OP-EDs, to include editing the final product. They also followed up with local respondents who wrote Letters to the Editor.

Through their efforts, Pat and Cynthia reinforced the need for a national popular vote system by educating readers across Florida about the importance of having an alternative to the Electoral College system. The National Popular Vote Interstate Compact was introduced in 2006; the League of Women Voters United States has supported the NPV since 2010 after a thorough study of its merits.
