Letter from the President

Dear Leaguers,

This month saw the passing of an incredible civil rights leader and public servant, Rep. John Lewis. During a time where Americans are reckoning with a long history of systemic racism and its impact on our democracy, it is his words that remind us to keep fighting and making "good trouble." (Read Rep. Lewis' final words <u>here</u>.)

I can think of no better way to memorialize his legacy than to ask our members to call their elected officials to tell them to support reauthorization of the Voting Rights Act and H.R. 1, the For the People Act, a



House bill that's purpose is "to expand Americans' access to the ballot box, reduce the influence of big money in politics, and strengthen ethics rules for public servants, and for other purposes."

Many, like John Lewis, sacrificed so much to ensure that civil rights, like voting, were extended to all Americans. We honor his legacy by continuing that fight as voter and election watchdogs, voter service providers, and voting rights advocates.

Everything You Need to Know About Voting in the Aug. 18 Primary

We're just days away from the Aug. 18 primary election — are you ready to vote?

Here are a few things you should keep in mind:

 Request your mail ballot now. If you haven't requested your mail ballot yet, please do it now at <u>votepinellas.com</u>. Go ahead; we'll be here when you get back.



• **Sign the back of your ballot envelope.** This is the top reason mail ballots are flagged for issues in Pinellas County! (And while you're at it, we encourage you to put your email address or phone number

there too — if there's an issue with your ballot, you want to hear about it as soon as possible, don't you?)

- **Get your ballot in on time!** You MUST get your ballot back to the Supervisor of Elections by 7 p.m. on Election Day. The postmarked date is not enough. This is one of the main reasons why mail ballots are not counted they don't get there in time!
- **Drop your ballot off in person.** Nervous about the postal service? The Supervisor of Elections has <u>23 locations</u> where you can drop off your ballot ahead of the election. Read the list carefully; it includes the dates and times when the ballot drop-off locations will be open. And make sure to put your ballot in the CORRECT drop-off box, i.e. NOT THE BOOK RETURN BOX.
- **Track your ballot.** You can use <u>this online tool</u> to make sure your ballot gets to the Supervisor of Elections office. It will also let you know if there are any issues with your ballot so you can be proactive about getting them resolved.

How to Empower Other Voters

- Make sure they know how to vote by mail. A lack of knowledge about voting by mail is a real obstacle faced by <u>many first-time</u> <u>mail voters</u>. If you've voted by mail before, use your experience to help newbie mail voters understand how to do it.
- Share accurate information. Disinformation campaigns that aim to confuse people about our elections are ramping up. You will be doing a great service for our community and the integrity of our electoral process by taking the time to think critically and do your due diligence before passing on information to others.
- Become a trained non-partisan poll monitor. The Voter and

Election Protection team is recruiting volunteers to serve as mobile poll monitors and social media monitors ahead of the Aug. 18 primary. The virtual training will be held Aug. 5; you can **register here**. More info can be found below.

 Become a poll worker (but only if you are comfortable doing so). One of the very real risks we're facing is a <u>shortage of poll</u> workers due to the pandemic. If you are at all comfortable doing so, please consider signing up to <u>become a poll worker</u>.

Spend Thursday nights in September with the LWVSPA and the candidates who are vying for your vote in the General Election!

for improved civic engagement;


- Execute an interactive mural in downtown St. Pete designed by local gay Latino artist <u>John Gascot</u>;

National Popular Vote

The National Popular Vote addresses the inequities of the "winner take all" system of awarding each state's electoral votes to the winner of a plurality in 48 states. It advocates for Every Vote Equal.

There are many calls by politicians, authors and social media influencers to abolish the Electoral system via an amendment. This is impractical and unnecessary as the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact is 70% of the way toward being implemented.

Formed in 2004 and using the states' rights, the NPVIC is passed by state legislators and goes into effect when 270 electors are pledged to vote for the winner in ALL 50 states.
