Get Ready for the Primary Election!

The 2020 primary election is Aug. 18, which is just weeks away. Are you prepared?

We're encouraging everyone to sign up to request a mail ballot for the coming elections, even if you'd prefer to vote in person. Here's why:

- The pandemic means we may see fewer polling places and fewer poll workers, which could mean long lines on Election Day.
- Some people such as people with disabilities have no choice but to vote in person, and so you'll be protecting those people from the possibility of additional exposure to COVID-19.
- You'll also be protecting the county's poll workers, many of whom

- are over the age of 60.
- Bonus: If you request your ballot early and send it back early, you'll also be taking some pressure off the USPS.

Think of it as your voting back-up plan: You may not end up needing to use it, but if you do, you'll be glad to have it.

What You Need to Vote by Mail

- Request a mail ballot
- Track your mail ballot
- 23 mail ballot drop-off locations
- Frequently asked questions about voting by mail

How to Get Informed About the Candidates

- Candidate Forums: We currently have two virtual candidate forums on the schedule: 6th Circuit judicial candidates on July 13 and school board candidates on July 23. (Our sister League in Manatee County is hosting one for District 70 on July 20.) For more information including how to watch them online visit our website.
- **Voter Guide:** The Voter Guide for the 2020 primary election is set to go live on July 14. **Sign up here** to be notified when it goes live.

How to Empower Other Voters



Check Out Our Vote-By-Mail Mural!

Last month, we were thrilled to announce that we'd commissioned two local artists - Jabari Reed-Diop and Derek Donnelly - to paint a mural promoting voting by mail on the outside of the Enoch Davis Community Center in south St. Petersburg.

The mural is part of our multiprong campaign aimed at encouraging people to sign up to vote by mail. We're particularly targeting people who live in low voter turnout areas in an effort to let them know what they need to do to vote by mail and how to make sure their mail ballot is counted.

LWVUS National Convention Highlights



Last month, the LWVSPA sent seven delegates to the **2020 LWVUS National Convention**, which was held entirely online for the first time in the League's history.

Despite a few technical hiccups, the convention was largely a success, driven in large part by the passionate delegates from Leagues all around the country who spoke beautifully and intelligently on a variety of issues.

Here are some of the highlights from this year's convention:

- We elected Dr. Barbara Ann Turner, of Omaha, Nebraska, as our next LWVUS president, and she <u>shared some remarks</u> on what she envisions as her priorities for her term.
- CEO Virginia Kase shared <u>some powerful and emotional</u> <u>thoughts</u> about the current state of our democracy, including racism and voter suppression.
- We voted to elevate the enforcement of diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) policies to the same level of organizational importance as our non-partisan status.
- We also voted in support of resolutions regarding climate change and racial justice.
- We adopted the **following program**, with the addition of the abolition of the electoral college to the areas of urgent focus.

Thanks to the delegates who dedicated a full weekend to taking part in the national convention! We appreciate you representing our local League on a national stage!
