Letter from the President

Dear Leaguers,

The past few weeks have been full of grief, anger, and frustration. Leagues across the United States are standing in solidarity with black communities as they mourn the death of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor amongst countless others and protest police violence and systemic racism.

I encourage Leaguers to do what they can to support these peaceful protests while being safe. You can donate to numerous bail funds and educate yourself about the history of white supremacy in our country and how to be a better ally and anti-racist.

I urge you to take the time to read, listen, and reflect on your experiences, feelings, and biases. The Social Justice team is starting a reading club for League members to do just this: create spaces for learning and listening.

We also have another **Coffee in Common** coming up on June 20 to talk about interracial allyship and friendship. Please take these opportunities to enrich yourself and our work fighting the systems of white supremacy that create barriers to democratic participation and civic engagement.

As we celebrate Pride month, it's important for us to recognize the intersectionality of all civil and social justice movements; we are stronger when we recognize our commonalities and stand together. Historic movements started with courageous demonstrations and protests which put many at great risk and resulted in greater sacrifices. We can continue to honor their fight by recognizing our common goals and values with movements fighting today.

At the end of the day, protests are just the beginning. Getting our community to vote with confidence and vote for the vision of the community they want to live in is the next step. It is our duty to empower voters and defend democracy for everyone in our community.

Amendment 4 Ruling: A Big Win for Voting Rights!



Florida's returning citizens and voting rights advocate had a big win last month!

A federal judge ruled that the law requiring returning citizens to pay fees, fines and restitution before their voting rights could be

restored was unconstitutional.

U.S. District Judge Robert Hinkle called the law a "pay-to-vote system" and ordered state officials to adopt a new process to determine whether returning citizens are eligible to vote. More information about the ruling can be found at the **Tampa Bay Times**.

Several of us were able to hear from Sean Morales-Doyle, the senior attorney for the Brennan Center for Justice, discuss this case during one of the weekly Lunch and Learns put on by the League of Women Voters of Florida. If you missed his presentation, you can still read his analysis here.

The candidate forum for the Sixth Circuit Court judicial candidates will be held on July 13 at 7 p.m. on the League's Facebook page.


The candidate forum for the Pinellas County School Board will be held later in July.
