



March 17 Elections: Are You Prepared?

Important Election Information You Should Know

The League strongly recommends the following methods for voting, in order of preference:

- 1. Voting early
- 2. Voting on Election Day



3. Voting by mail (and if you do vote by mail, the League recommends you deliver your ballot by hand to a staff member at a Supervisor of Elections office and call a few days later to ensure it was received).

Early Voting

Here's what you should know if you plan to vote early:

- Dates are March 7-15 (M-F 10 a.m. 6 p.m., Sat.-Sun. 9 a.m. 5 p.m.)
- Early voting locations can be found here.

Voting on Election Day

Here's what you should know if you plan to vote on Election Day:

- You can find your polling place <u>by looking here</u>. Do not assume your polling place is the same from year to year.
- Make sure you have <u>acceptable</u>, valid signature and photo ID when you go vote.
- Give yourself plenty of time in case you run into problems.

Vote By Mail

Here's what you should know if you plan to vote by mail:

- Your ballot must be at the Supervisor of Elections' office by 7 p.m. on March 17 (Election Day).
- YOU MUST SIGN THE BACK OF YOUR ENVELOPE. The Supervisor of Elections' office has told us this is one of the most common reasons for issues with VBM ballots. Please ensure your ballot is signed before you turn it in!
- You can check the status of your vote-by-mail ballot here.

The Election and Voter Protection team will be operating poll monitors outside of priority polling places on Election Day. If you or someone you know runs into any issues with voting, you can either seek out a volunteer or you can call 866-OUR-VOTE to get legal assistance with your issue.

The first Earth Day in 1970 launched a wave of action, including the passage of landmark environmental laws in the United States. The Clean Air, Clean Water and Endangered Species Acts were created in response to the first Earth Day in 1970, as well as the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency. Many countries soon adopted similar laws.

Earth Day continues to hold major international significance. In 2016, the United Nations chose Earth Day as the day when the historic Paris Agreement on climate change was signed into force.



Bowl-a-Thon for the Tampa Bay Abortion Fund

The LWVSPA is joining forces with the Tampa Bay Abortion Fund to make abortion access a reality for Tampa Bay women in need.

The Tampa Bay Abortion Fund, which is in its second year of operation as a nonprofit, is a

group of volunteers who help those struggling to access abortions and other forms of reproductive healthcare due to low finances.

As part of a wave of push-back against a nationwide wave of anti-abortion legislation, the LWVSPA's Reproductive Rights Action Team is helping Tampa Bay Abortion Fund (TBAF) by co-sponsoring the Bowl-A-Thon for TBAF.



When: Sunday, April 26 at 12-3 p.m.

This fundraiser is in direct response to the forced parental consent bill passed recently by the Florida legislature -- a Trojan Horse of a bill designed to undermine Floridians' right to privacy and to bring an end to abortion access in our state.

LWVSPA and the Tampa Bay Abortion Fund are also conscious of the potential impact of the current administration on federal and state abortion laws. There is an antiabortion majority on the Supreme Court, nefarious legislation everywhere we turn (nearly 300 laws restricting abortion have been passed since 2010), and anti-abortion legislators emboldened to pass bills.

We're responding by celebrating access to show the world that abortion is a necessary part of health care, people should have full insurance coverage, and community care means making sure people can access the abortions they want and need.

Immigration

The action team continues to support migrants seeking asylum in this country but are being forced to remain in Mexico to await their immigration court date — by bringing attention to their plight via education and then advocate for their relief.



Last month, the team hosted an Immigration Conversation led by a witness who traveled to the Brownsville, TX/Matamoros, MX border and recently talked with migrants trapped in Matamoros. The team also continues to advocate for passage of the The Refugee Protection Act (H.R. 5210 and S. 2936).

National Popular Vote

The National Popular Vote has been signed into law in 15 states and DC for a total of 196 Electoral Votes. The president is elected by 270+ electoral votes. The NPV passed the House in VA but was tabled until 2021 by the VA Senate, so the team didn't add any states to the compact during 2020 legislative sessions.

Consequently, the team won't be implementing the National Popular Vote option in the 2020 election. The team feels strongly that they can secure the needed 74 electoral votes (probably 5-6 additional states) by 2024.

In Florida, the bills were filed in 2020, which gave advocates the opportunity to talk about it in one committee during discussions about a House Resolution. Our lobbyist and the chair of Floridians for NPV flew into Tallahassee and were able to talk for 10 minutes. Several legislators approached them afterwards to thank them for clarifying how the Compact works.
