And if you're not in one of the **10 communities** voting on March 9, you can still help out by sharing our voter education resources with your local friends and family; and ask them to do the same!




Legislative Update Be on the lookout for Action Alerts from LWVFL

LWVFL Opposes HB 1 & SB 484: Anti-Protest Legislation

The right to peacefully protest is part of who we are as a nation and is an important way for citizens to enact change.

Governor Ron DeSantis has threatened that right by introducing dangerous anti-protest legislation. As League members, we know that protests are an indispensable part of our democracy.



The League is continuing to do everything in our power to stop this legislation. It is is undemocratic and threatens the shared values of Americans.


LWVFL Opposes SB 90: Vote-by-Mail Ballots

As written, SB 90 will make voters work harder to get mail-in ballots. Parts of this bill complicate voting by mail in Florida for voters, Supervisors of Elections, our own Secretary of State and numerous civic organizations like the League.

Parts of this bill we in fact do like--canvassing vote-by-mail ballots as soon as a county finishes Logic and Accuracy testing makes sense. That good change is overshadowed by a drastic change to the mail-in ballot process. Under current law, a mail ballot request is valid through two election cycles, or up to four years. This bill, as written, would require voters to ask for a mail ballot over and over, every calendar year, year after year. **LWVFL will continue to monitor it closely and issue Action Alerts accordingly.**

The idea for Century for a Century was the brain child of LWVSPA President Linsey Grove who writes:

"The idea for this event came from us learning about the suffragists and the use of bicycles as a means to gain independence as part of our 100 year anniversary. My spouse is an avid cyclist and had been talking about doing a "century" or 100 mile bike race. I put the two meanings together and came up with a Century for a Century as a virtual challenge. Doing fundraising events has been hard this year but this seemed like a great compromise. It highlighted the tenacious spirit of the suffragists, protecting folks against COVID, and promoting health! I'm so proud of the participants of the race and happy with the results of our first race! I'd like to thank **Rachel Gallo** for being our Volunteer Race Director and our Fundraising Team for their support."

Forty-five participants signed up for the Century for a Century event. Some joined as individuals, and some as groups with such interesting names as "Spicy Pepper Sauce", and "Pass-a-grille Pelican Power." Everyone who joined together to make this event a success is a **WINNER**.



FOCUS: SOCIAL JUSTICE ACTION TEAM

Each month, the Voter shines a light on the work being done by one of our Action and Education Teams. This month the focus is on the Social Justice Action Team.

While Manatee and Hillsborough counties have passed resolutions declaring racism a public health crisis, no city in Florida has yet done so. The Social Justice Action Team wants St. Pete to be the first. Working with the Black Health Equity

Alliance, Foundation for a Healthy St. Pete, and Council Member Amy Foster, the League of Women Voters of the St. Petersburg Area is putting forward a resolution declaring racism a public health crisis that includes concrete action items for change. When the resolution makes it to City Council for a vote, everyone will have the opportunity to call to voice support.

The Social Justice Action Team is relatively new, but brings together interests and priorities that have been long standing



values for many members. Linsey Grove, president of LWV St. Pete and co-lead of the team highlighted her own realization that if the League was truly committed to embedding diversity, equity, and inclusion throughout, there should be a group to house and expand on that work. This wasn't a hard sell, with many League members interested in social justice and looking for ways to do more.

If the League of Women Voters wants to be a diverse, community-driven league, relevant to many communities, "we can't do that sitting at our own table," says Linsey. Instead of asking people to "come sit at our table," the social justice team is finding ways to sit at other tables and support community initiatives. In addition to co-hosting Coffee in Common and holding a social justice discussion club, members of the team attend community meetings and find ways to bridge the League with other community-led efforts. Karen first got involved with the League in 2014 when she was working with Move to Amend to get a resolution passed by St. Pete City Council: "Money is Not Speech; Corporations are Not People." It passed, and the next year the group decided to work for a city-wide ordinance, which would be more meaningful. The Defend Our Democracy ordinance for campaign finance reform in St. Pete was started. The League joined the effort in 2016. The ordinance passed in 2017 and hasn't been contested or appealed since its passage. You can find more about the ordinance and the League's work to pass it here.

Karen's other main focus is the Leif Nissen Social Justice Lecture Series at Temple Beth-El, which she started in 2013 to honor her son, who died in a car accident in 2008. The next lecture, co-sponsored by the League, will feature Pulitzer Prize-winning political cartoonist Mark Fiore on March 4th at 7 pm via Zoom (featured above).
